DEFINITION

Clinical Psychology is a specialty in psychology that involves the practical application of psychological theories for treating psychological problems and disorders (Pomerantz, 2016). It encompasses the prevention, assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of many complex human behaviors, problems, and disorders (APA, 2014).

Cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) is an approach that a clinical psychologist may take. CBT focuses on identifying and becoming aware of inaccurate and negative thinking. CBT is a very popular approach and is highly effective for many psychological concerns and problems.
