communications channel with no predetermined secret this invention and the ones that followed it revolutionized the world of digital communication In the 1980s and 1990s elliptic curves revolutionized number theory providing striking new insights into the congruent number problem primality testing publ key cryptography attacks on public key systems and playing a central role in Andrew Wiles resolution of Fermat s Last Theorem
