

Body Temperature

Temperature is monitored and controlled by the thermoregulatory centre in the brain. The thermoregulatory centre receives information about a rise in the temperature of the blood. The skin contains temperature receptors and thermoregulatory centres in the thermoregulatory centre.

Body temperature is too high, blood vessels dilate (vasodilation) and sweat is produced from the sweat glands. Heat loss mechanisms cause a transfer of energy from the skin to the environment.

Body temperature is too low, blood vessels constrict (vasoconstriction) which means less blood flows through the skin, so less energy is lost to the surroundings. In addition, shivering stops and skeletal muscles contract which releases energy in the form of heat.

Endocrine System

Endocrine system is composed of glands which secrete chemicals called hormones directly into the blood. The blood carries the hormones to a target organ where it produces an effect. Compared to the nervous system the effects are slower but last for longer. The pituitary gland in the brain is a 'master gland' which releases hormones into the blood to regulate body conditions. These hormones in turn act on other glands to stimulate other hormones to be released to bring about effects.




Endocrine gland	Role of the hormone
Pituitary	Controls growth in children Stimulates the thyroid gland to make the enzyme to control metabolism In women it stimulates the ovaries to produce and release eggs and more oestrogen In men it stimulates the testes to make sperm and testosterone
Thyroid	Controls the metabolic rate of the body
Adrenals	Controls the levels of glucose in the blood
Adrenal	Prepares the body for stressful situations (fight or flight response)
Testes	Controls the development of the male secondary sexual characteristics and is involved in the production of sperm

Birth and Menstruation

Birth is controlled with negative feedback loop. If you are not pregnant, oestrogen and progesterone your body needs to be higher when your **uterine glands** located on top of the uterus produce oestrogen which causes a rise in temperature, you to be considered pregnant for 100 days, until the temperature decreases, most blamed to the top of the uterus.

Ovaries gland is your body's sex glands from your diet to use the hormone progesterone. This contains oestrogen and progesterone in the blood enters into which are as a result of negative feedback control. Forcing the ovary gland and hormone to produce their stimulating hormone (FSH).




Unit 5: Homeostasis and Response

Negative Feedback

Negative feedback systems exist to maintain a steady state. If a factor in the external environment increases, changes take place to reduce it and restore the original level. If a factor in the internal environment decreases, changes take place to increase it and restore the original level.

Many hormones are involved in negative feedback systems including insulin, glucagon, female sex hormones and thyroxine.



Control of Blood Glucose Concentration

Blood glucose concentration is monitored and control act by the pancreas. It is essential that your cells have a constant level of glucose they need to respire.

Insulin and the control of blood glucose levels

When you spend a long time, large amounts of glucose pass into your blood. Without insulin molecules, your blood glucose levels would rise significantly. This would cause harm very high after a meal is not too dangerous later. The pancreas is stimulated by the pancreas. If the blood glucose concentration is too high, the pancreas produces the hormone insulin that causes glucose to move from the blood into the cells. Insulin and glucose to be taken glucose is converted to glycogen for storage. When glycogen stores are full, any extra glucose is converted into fats and these will be only passed to other parts of the body.

Glucagon and control of blood glucose levels

When your blood glucose concentration falls below the set range, the pancreas secretes another hormone called glucagon. Glucagon causes your liver to release glycogen, converting it back into glucose in the way. The stored glucose is then sent into the blood.


By using two hormones and the glucose stores in your liver, your pancreas keeps your blood glucose constant after food is eaten. It does this using negative feedback control, which has an inhibiting link between the two hormones.

Type 1 Diabetes

Type 1 diabetes is a disease in which the pancreas fails to produce enough insulin. It is characterised by abnormally high blood glucose levels and is normally treated with insulin injections. Doctors can transplant a pancreas successfully, but the operations are difficult as there are not enough pancreas donors and risks. Scientists hope that eventually they will be able to genetically engineer fully formed pancreatic cells in the body which work properly, then they will be able to cure it of the patient with no requirement.

Type 2 Diabetes

In Type 2 diabetes the body cells no longer respond to insulin produced by the pancreas. Type 2 diabetes is linked to obesity, lack of exercise and old age. It can often be treated without needing to inject insulin. Many people can reduce excess blood glucose by eating less, losing more mass, eating a balanced diet, losing weight and doing regular exercise. Doctors can also use drugs that help insulin work better in the body cells, help your pancreas make more insulin and/or the amount of glucose you absorb from your gut. If none of these work insulin injections will be needed.



Female Sex Hormones

During puberty, reproductive hormones cause secondary sex characteristics to develop. Oestrogen is the main female reproductive hormone produced in the ovaries. All puberty eggs begin to mature and are released approximately every 28 days. The released oestrogen, testosterone is the main male reproductive hormone produced by the testes and stimulates sperm production. Sexual hormones are involved in the menstrual cycle of a woman.

1. This is released by the pituitary gland. It makes eggs mature in their ovaries in the ovaries. It also stimulates the ovaries to produce oestrogen and progesterone.
2. Oestrogen is made and released by the ovaries in response to FSH. It stimulates the lining of the uterus to thicken. High levels of oestrogen inhibit the production of more FSH and stimulates the release of LH so made in the pituitary gland stimulates the release of a mature egg from the ovary. LH is released for 10-15 minutes, so hours before ovulation. Progesterone is secreted by the empty egg follicle in the ovary after ovulation. Progesterone stimulates thickening of the uterus so it is ready to receive a fertilised egg.



Fertility Treatment and IVF

Lots of women who were not pregnant but do not make enough FSH to stimulate the maturation of the egg in their ovaries. Fortunately there are pills which do this which stimulate the egg in the ovary to mature and also trigger ovulation. Some women who are infertile can be treated in this way.

The IVF process

They give women drugs that eggs to mature. They collect the eggs from the ovary and fertilise with sperm in the lab. They then develop the embryos and are inserted back into the uterus.

Contraception - Non-hormonal methods

The pill - prevents the ovaries from releasing an egg each month (ovulation). It also thins the mucus that is made for sperm to get through the lining of the uterus, so there is less chance of fertilising egg implanting. When taken correctly, the pill is over 99% effective. The patch - sticks on the skin of your belly or upper arm. It releases a hormone which is used for 1 week, and it is used for 3 weeks in between. The ring - one both inside and out, this can absorb some of a material. The ring releases hormones into your blood to prevent you from getting pregnant. The cap - The cap is used to release the hormone progesterone. Your bloodstream to prevent pregnancy.

Contraception - Hormonal methods

Injectable - an intramuscular injection (into the muscle) which is used every 3 months, making it more difficult for sperm to reach an egg. It can also stop a fertilised egg from being able to implant. Barrier methods (condoms) - barrier methods such as the diaphragm, male condom, and female condom, can be used as methods of birth control. Barrier methods prevent sperm from coming into contact with the egg. For reaching the sperm and fertilisation, a sperm's path is blocked in a vaginal canal.
